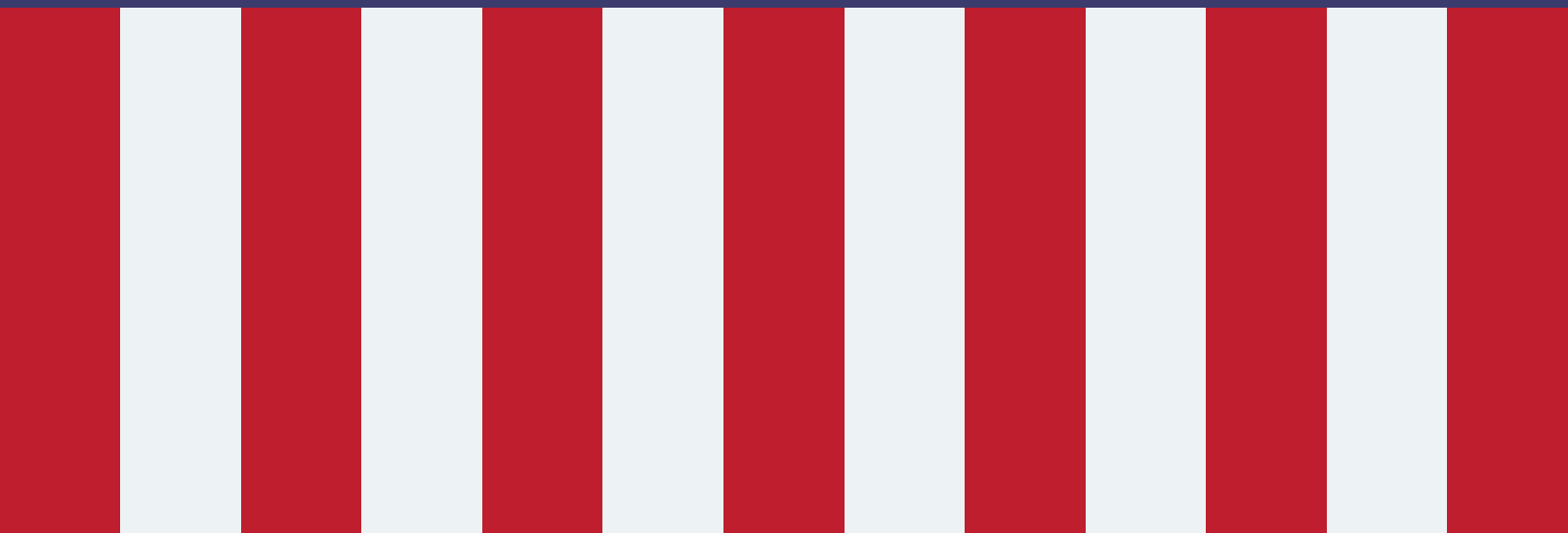

INTRODUCTION

The Council on American-Islamic Relations (CAIR), the nation's largest Muslim civil rights and advocacy organization, has produced two unique resources that make up our CAIR 2020 National Voter Guide. This resource will help educate American Muslim community members and allies as they plan to vote in the 2020 November elections. Inside this guide, you will find:

- a presidential voter guide, and
- a U.S. congressional scorecard

The presidential voter guide includes short biographies of Democratic Party nominee Joseph Biden, Republican Party nominee Donald Trump, Libertarian Party nominee Jo Jorgensen, Green Party nominee Howie Hawkins, and the Party for Socialism and Liberation (PSL) candidate Gloria Estela La Riva. It also includes a summary of their views and positions on the key campaign issues such as economy, climate change and environment, healthcare, domestic national security, Islam and Muslims, acting as commander in chief, immigration, civil rights, and education.

While a two-party electoral system has emerged over the course of the United States' 244-year democratic experience, CAIR believes in ensuring the American Muslim community is informed of all presidential candidates and their voting options before casting ballots for the highest office in the land.

The list of candidates for president featured in this resource is not exhaustive, and CAIR encourages the American Muslim community to do further research on other candidates running for president.

The U.S. congressional scorecard reflects the voting performance of many representatives from the U.S. Congress that are up for re-election in 2020. The votes of each legislator have been rated positively with green font (example: Y, N, Cosponsor) or negatively with red font (example: Y, N, Cosponsor) depending on how closely their votes on relevant legislation corresponded with civil rights and social justice priorities identified by CAIR. The criteria selected for each topic is rooted in legislation introduced and voted upon in the 116th Congress from 2019-2020.

Since the amount of legislation introduced in the 116th Congress is rather expansive, please note that elected officials should not be judged by these criteria alone. This scorecard is intended to provide a general profile that we hope will assist voters in better understanding the attitudes of elected officials on key issues. A member of Congress' lack of co-sponsorship does not necessarily indicate their position on a given bill. CAIR makes no claims as to the favorability of one candidate being elected over another. Therefore, we encourage readers of this guide to further research the actions of their local representatives before supporting any candidate.

The 2020 election cycle once again presents the American Muslim community with an important opportunity to increase its political capacity and presence. With large concentrations of American Muslim voters in key swing states such as Michigan, Virginia, Florida, Arizona, Ohio and North Carolina, the American Muslim population has the potential to influence who will be the next president of the United States and determine the results of local, state, and federal elections.

As a nonpartisan organization, CAIR can encourage American Muslims to participate in national and state elections, conduct voter registration and get-out-the-vote drives, provide training programs, issue briefings, organize candidate forums, volunteer in campaigns, and lead get-out-the-vote drives. Nonprofits cannot engage in political activities that support one candidate or party over another, but we are committed to making our community's voice and vote heard.

DONALD JOHN TRUMP

PARTY: Republican

Economy: Trump signed into law the Tax Cuts and Jobs Act of 2017 (TCJA), the largest overhaul in the tax code passed by Congress in the last three decades. It created a singular corporate tax rate of 21%. Tax brackets have kept their original structure of seven brackets but the rates have been lowered from 39.6% to 37% for the top rate, the 33% bracket dropped to 32%, the 28% bracket to 24%, the 25% bracket to 22%, and the 15% bracket to 12%. The lowest bracket remained at 10%, and the 35% bracket was also unchanged. Most tax benefits for families and individuals will expire by 2025.

As President, Trump raised new tariffs on almost \$450 million of steel and aluminum. These tariffs mostly affected imports from China, Japan and Taiwan. He has also removed the United States from the North American Free Trade Agreement (NAFTA) and replaced it with the United States–Mexico–Canada Agreement trade deal.

Climate Change and Environment: Trump withdrew the U.S. from the Paris Climate Agreement and rescinded the Clean Power Plan. The Department of the Interior under Trump's leadership, "proposed its largest oil and gas lease of over 78 million acres in the Gulf of Mexico." Trump approved the Keystone XL, New Burgos, and Dakota Access Pipelines while publicly casting doubt on the existence of human-induced climate change.

Healthcare: Trump has made clear that he would like to "repeal and replace Obamacare" with Health Savings Accounts (HSAs) and work with states to "establish high-risk pools to ensure access to coverage." This model would permit health insurance companies to provide coverage in all 50 states and provide block grants to states to plan and distribute Medicaid resources and benefits. In response to COVID-19, Trump held a news conference in February where he stated: "It's going to disappear. One day it's like a miracle – it will disappear." Later, when the issue became more severe, he said "I've always known this is a real – this is a pandemic. I felt it was a pandemic long before it was called a pandemic. I've always viewed it as very serious." There has been a lack of tests available to the public and the virus is still spreading at an exponential rate. Currently, the United States stands at 6.4 million cases and over 206,000 COVID-19 related deaths.

Domestic National Security: The Trump administration requested lawmakers to permanently authorize the National Security Agency legal authority to gain access to the logs of Americans' domestic communications. Trump has cited how Israel's use of racial and religious profiling has "done an unbelievable job" in preventing terrorism and promoted the U.S. adoption of such law enforcement techniques.

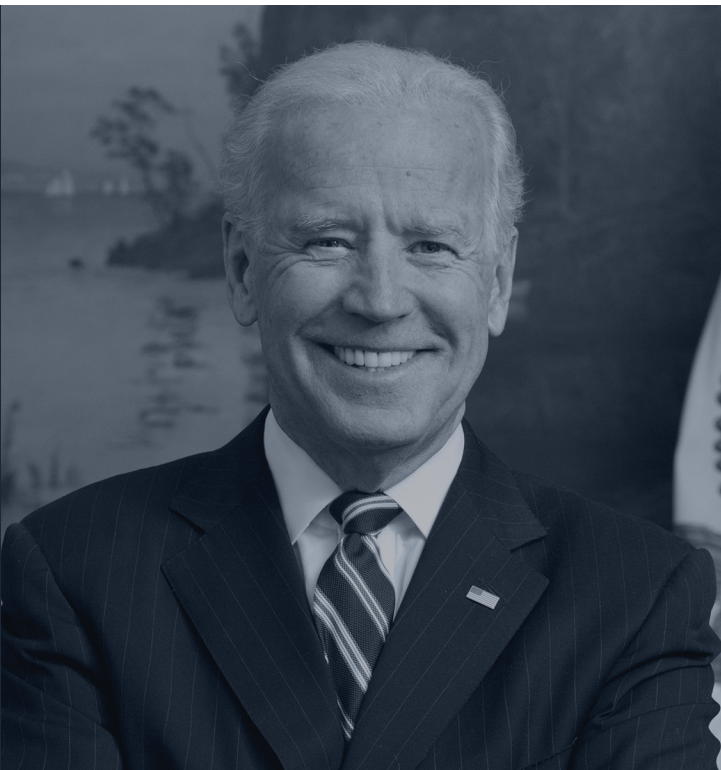
Views on Islam and Muslims: As President, Trump signed an Executive Order that banned foreign nationals from seven predominantly Muslim countries from entering the United States, commonly known as the "Muslim Ban." The executive action also suspended the entry of Syrian refugees indefinitely. While campaigning in 2016, Trump stated, "Islam hates us" and American Muslims have a "level of hatred." Trump asserts that American Muslims do not report "bad" people to law enforcement. Following the September 11th terrorist attacks, Trump falsely claimed that he watched thousands of American Muslims in Jersey City and New Jersey cheer on and celebrate the falling of the Twin Towers.

Commander-in-Chief: During his presidency, Trump reversed the defense sequester and increased military spending to its highest level since World War II. Trump seeks to reduce the U.S. presence in Iraq, Afghanistan and Syria while increasing U.S. involvement in other conflicts in Yemen and Somalia. He withdrew from the "Iran Nuclear Deal" and ordered the assassination of a high-ranking Iranian government official, General Qasem Soleimani. Additionally, Trump met with North Korean President Kim Jong Un to work toward North Korean denuclearization. He has supported regime change in Venezuela and enabled regime change in Bolivia.

Immigration: During his presidency, Trump rescinded the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals policy, commonly known as DACA. As of June 19, he has replaced 213 miles of fencing along the US-Mexico border with a wall, has built 3 miles of new border wall, and promises to continue construction of the border wall at an increased pace. Trump hired 10,000 new Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) agents and 5,000 new border patrol agents. He has deported roughly a quarter million undocumented immigrants annually over the course of his presidency and has pledged to continue to prioritize deportations. Under the Trump administration, thousands of undocumented migrant children were separated from their families while detained at the US-Mexico border. Though this practice was stopped via executive order after public outrage and efforts were made by the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) to reunite some of the children with their families, thousands remain separated.

Civil Rights: Trump has kept open the military prison at Guantanamo Bay and has mentioned support for racial and religious profiling, torture, and domestic surveillance programs, though these are opposed by most of the nation's civil and human rights organizations. After being elected to president the DOJ dropped its position that Texas's voter ID law, then under legal challenge, was intentionally racially discriminatory. The district court still ruled against the ID law. Ended the U.S. Census a month early and sought to add a citizenship question – viewed by many as an attempt to suppress participation in the count by undocumented residents and minority communities. While the Supreme Court allowed the census to end a month early, a lower federal court prevented a citizenship question from being added. Ordered use of the U.S. military to clear protestors in front of the White House and dispatched unmarked federal agents from DHS to illegally detain Black Lives Matters protestors in Portland, Oregon.

Education: Trump has consistently reduced the Department of Education budget by billions of dollars, most recently proposing cuts of 7.8 percent, or 5.6 billion dollars, for FY2021. He would work to replace ESSA (Every Student Succeeds Act) with a block grant and cut 5 billion dollars from the program. Trump also proposed a \$5-billion-dollar tax credit for private and vocational school scholarships, potentially diverting funds from public schools.



JOSEPH ROBINETTE BIDEN JR.

PARTY: Democratic

PROFESSION: Former Vice President of the United States, U.S. Senator from Delaware, New Castle County Councilman.

AGE: 77

Economy: Joe Biden would reverse some of the Trump administration's tax cuts for corporations, increase the top personal income rate to 39.6% (after it was lowered to 37% by the Trump Administration's TCJA), and cap itemized deductions at 28%. Taxes would not be raised on Americans making less than \$400,000 annually. Biden supports raising the federal minimum wage to \$15 and will "encourage and incentivize unionization and collective bargaining." He intends to create a Public Health Jobs Corps tasked with creating jobs to fight the COVID-19 pandemic, in addition to his plans to prioritize manufacturing in the US.

Climate Change and Environment: Joe Biden would invest \$2 trillion in a climate plan, that would ensure net zero emissions by at least 2050 and a transition to a "100% clean energy economy." Biden would rejoin the Paris Climate Agreement and spearhead a campaign to encourage other countries to decrease their carbon emissions. He seeks to provide disadvantaged communities access to clean transit, sustainable and affordable housing, clean water, and clean energy.

Healthcare: Not to be confused with Medicare-for-All, Biden's healthcare plan is to defend and expand the Affordable Care Act, commonly known as Obamacare, which he estimates will increase insurance coverage to 97% of Americans. This plan would give Americans choice in their healthcare insurance, including a public option "like Medicare." He would raise the value of premium tax credits for middle class families, eliminating any income cap to eligibility for this credit and "lowering the limit on the cost of coverage from 9.86% of income to 8.5%." Biden would cap the price of most drug price increases at the rate of inflation and would double current federal funding for community health centers.

Domestic National Security: Despite implementing Countering Violent Extremism (CVE) programs while serving in the Obama administration, Biden now pledges to "confront discriminatory policies that single out Muslim-Americans." He stands firmly against defunding the police, proposing a \$300 million

increase in federal funding to “reinvigorate community policing.” Biden supports universal background checks for weapons purchases and would ban further production and sale of assault weapons.

Views on Islam and Muslims: Joe Biden promises to “ensure that our government’s engagement with Muslims is not viewed through a security lens.” He has committed to protect religious freedom and fight against religion-based hate crimes which disproportionately affect American Muslims. He also has stated a desire for school curricula to include more information on the Islamic faith.

Commander-in-Chief: Biden plans to host a Summit for Democracy to strengthen ties among fellow democratic countries and solidify their democratic institutions. He has pledged to “end... wars in Afghanistan and the Middle East”, though he would keep some troops in Afghanistan to fight Al-Qaeda and ISIS but would end US support for the Saudi war in Yemen. Biden would counter “Russia’s attacks on Western democracies” and craft “new arms control arrangements,” work to “win the competition for the future against China” and support sovereignty of Hong Kong, continue over \$3 billion in unconditional military aid to Israel, attempt to re-enter and strengthen the Iran Nuclear Deal, and pursue denuclearization of North Korea.

Immigration: He pledges to end the Muslim Ban “on day one” in office and supports the No Ban Act. Biden would stop family separations at the border and would re-implement DACA and allow Dreamers to receive federal student aid. He would reverse the Trump administration’s public charge rule, which critics call a wealth test for immigrants seeking visas. Biden does not support dismantling ICE, would increase funding for ICE and CBP training, and would install independent oversight over ICE and CBP activities.

Civil Rights: Joe Biden supports the Voting Rights Act and would implement automatic voter registration and same-day voter registration. He would work to reform the criminal justice system by ending for-profit prisons, cash bail and the death penalty. Biden would invest \$1 billion dollars in juvenile justice reform and amend long-standing policies on drug-use, ending incarceration for drug-use offenses alone, decriminalizing marijuana-use, and “(expunging) all cannabis use convictions.”

Education: For K-12, Joe Biden would increase Title 1 funding by 300%, directing it toward school districts in low-income communities and prioritizing higher teacher salaries. He would double the number of healthcare providers in schools and work to increase diversity of educators and student bodies. For higher level education, Biden supports tuition-free public colleges and universities for students whose families bring in less than \$125,000 in income. “Any hard-working individual” would also be provided with two years of community college or training program, debt-free. Additionally, Biden would forgive student debt for prior attendees of public colleges and universities.



JO JORGENSEN

PARTY: Libertarian

PROFESSION: Senior Lecturer in Psychology at Clemson University, founder of business consulting company, president of a software duplication company, marketing Representative for IBM

AGE: 63

RESIDENCE: Libertyville, IL

OCCUPATION: Lecturer, Businesswoman

Economy: Jorgensen would “work to eliminate policies that cripple economic growth” and “give special attention to regulations driving up the cost of housing and health care, as well as those creating barriers to creating new businesses or entering professions.” She would cease borrowing from other countries and oppose any spending leading to a deficit.

Climate Change and Environment: Jorgensen would prioritize investment in nuclear power and allow off-grid to use of solar power.

Healthcare: She would allow “real price competition” to lower healthcare costs, rejecting both public and private insurance options.

Domestic National Security: Jorgensen would “end civil asset forfeiture prior to conviction,” pardon those convicted of non-violent crimes, and “end the... War on Drugs.”

Views on Islam and Muslims: She has not made any public statements pertaining to Islam or Muslims.

Commander-in-Chief: She would end all involvement in foreign wars and cease all foreign military aid, maintain armed forces solely for protection, and operate with a philosophy of neutrality in global conflict akin to Switzerland.

Immigration: Jorgensen would “work to repeal arbitrary quotas on the number of people who can legally enter the United States to work, visit, or reside.”

Civil Rights: She views smaller government as the road to greater freedom for all. Otherwise, she has not made any public statements pertaining to civil rights.

Education: She would eliminate the Department of Education.



HOWIE HAWKINS

PARTY: Green

PROFESSION: Co-founder of the Green Party, Former Teamster at UPS, Green Party Candidate for NY Governor and for City Council, Mayor, and Auditor in Syracuse, NY

AGE: 67

RESIDENCE: Syracuse, NY

OCCUPATION: Organizer

Economy: Hawkins would work to implement a locally planned and federally funded Job Guarantee program that would provide jobs to the unemployed. He would work to enforce a \$20/hour minimum wage and would “nationalize Big Oil and the power and gas utilities into a democratically-managed public energy system.” Hawkins would then facilitate public ownership of Big Banks and Industries.

Climate Change and Environment: Hawkins is in favor of the eco-socialist Green New Deal and would work to bring the U.S. to 100% greenhouse gas reductions and clean renewable energy by 2030. He would enforce a nationwide ban on fracking and all new fossil fuel infrastructure. He would convert all sectors of production, including agriculture, manufacturing, transportation, etc., into ecologically sustainable technologies.

Healthcare: Hawkins is in support of National Health Insurance, a single-payer improved Medicare for All and would work to create a community-based National Health Service with democratically elected local health boards and publicly-owned health-care facilities to ensure accountability and effectiveness at controlling costs.

Domestic National Security: He calls “for a total ban on warrantless mass surveillance” by the U.S. government. Hawkins would order federal investigations of local police misconduct as a step in working towards a transition to community control of the police. He would pardon whistle blowers and political prisoners.

Views on Islam and Muslims: Hawkins denounced the Supreme Court’s 2018 decision to uphold the Muslim ban. He defended Islam and Muslims against accusations that they are all to blame for the attack on 9/11 and clarified that the attacks were the “acts of a small group of criminal terrorists.”

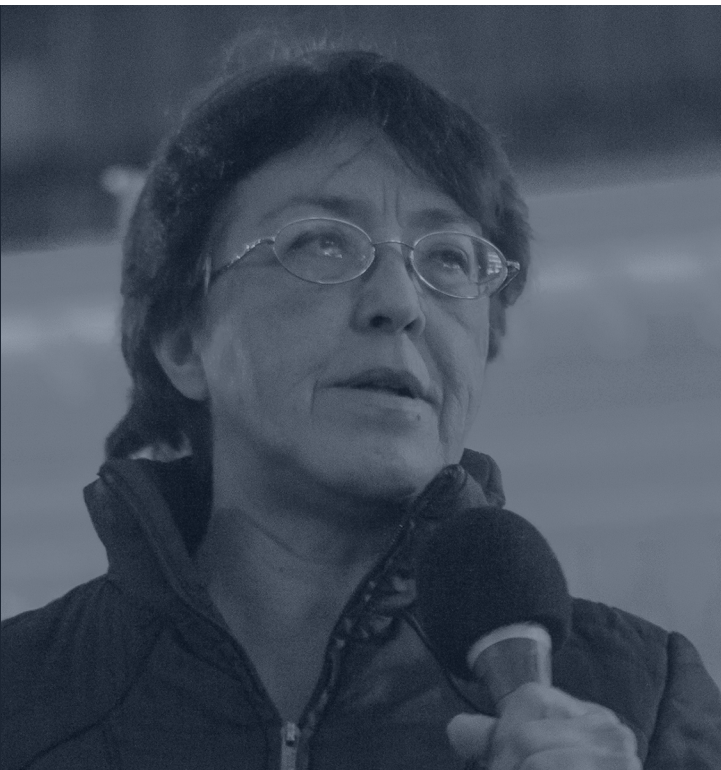
Commander-in-Chief: Would bring home U.S. troops and end U.S. involvement in wars, as well as decrease the military budget by 75%. Hawkins would have the U.S. pledge to only use nuclear

weapons in retaliation of a nuclear attack, otherwise known as a no-first-use policy. He would then negotiate with nuclear powers to “enact the Treaty of the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons.”

Immigration: Hawkins would provide legal status for undocumented immigrants. He would close migrant detention camps and facilitate swift family reunification. He would also work to enforce open borders, like the way the European Union operates.

Civil Rights: Hawkins would end the war on drugs and mass incarceration. He calls “for the legalization of marijuana and the decriminalization of other drugs,” including opioids. Hawkins is also committed to protecting abortion rights.

Education: He would work to provide “lifelong, tuition-free public education, from childcare and pre-K through K-12 to college, technical, and graduate studies at any age.” Hawkins would increase federal funding of public schools.



GLORIA LA RIVA

PARTY: Party for Socialism and Liberation

PROFESSION: Director of the National Committee to Free the Cuban Five and President of the typographical sector of the Northern California Media Workers Union

AGE: 66

RESIDENCE: Albuquerque, New Mexico

OCCUPATION: Newspaper printer, activist

Economy: La Riva plans to seize the assets of billionaires and use the resources for the interest of the vast majority. She believes “power must be taken out of the hands of the super-rich, and the Wall Street criminals must be jailed.” La Riva would also like to expand labor unions and require employers to recognize card check union votes. She focuses on organizing low-wage workers and rebuilding the labor movement.

Healthcare: She plans to create a completely free and public healthcare system, including free, safe and legal abortion.

Domestic National Security: La Riva believes police currently terrorize black and brown communities and would work to defund the police and replace it with “alternative, safe ways to resolve disputes” to “de-escalate tensions” and better help those “suffering mental crises.”

Views on Islam and Muslims: She has condemned President Trump’s “fascistic attacks on Muslims” and would reverse the Muslim Ban, which she views as racist, collective punishment. La Riva believes that the Muslim community in America and around the world has been unfairly held accountable for the actions of ISIS and Al Qaeda, and rejects the US’ “terrorist killings of people in the Middle East” approved of by “Democrats and Republicans alike.”

Commander-in-Chief: She believes all the U.S. military bases around the world should be shut down and troops should come home. La Riva would cease US military aid to Israel and believes the Palestinian people deserve the right to return to their land. She would end the U.S. blockade of Cuba and the sanctions against Venezuela, Iran, and all other countries.

Immigration: La Riva would abolish all anti-immigration laws and shut down ICE and camps at the border to reunite separated migrant families. She believes “the government’s war on immigration must end” and pursues amnesty and citizenship for those without documents. She has organized and spoken at mass marches for immigration rights for the past 30 years.

Civil Rights: La Riva believes in equality for women. She would actively seek to close the wage gap between men and women and erase the gendered division of labor. La Riva seeks to end racism, police brutality and mass incarceration of the African American community.

Education: She plans to make education free and cancel all student debt.

CONGRESSIONAL SCORECARD

Legislation and Votes of Interest to CAIR

VOTING RIGHTS ADVANCEMENT ACT

H.R.4 - VOTING RIGHTS ADVANCEMENT ACT

ABOUT: H.R.4, introduced by Rep. Terri Sewell (D-Alab.) would create new criteria for determining whether a state and political subdivisions require preclearance before altering vote practices in that area. Preclearance is the process of receiving preapproval from the Department of Justice or the U.S. District Court for the District of Columbia before making legal changes that may affect voting rights.

This bill also specifies practices which jurisdictions meeting certain thresholds regarding racial minority groups, language minority groups, and minority groups on Indian land, must preclear before implementing. These practices include changing jurisdiction boundaries, methods of elections, and voting locations.

CAIR notes that this bill will prevent states from targeting minority groups and suppressing their vote.

STATUS: H.R.4 passed in the House in a vote of 228-187; it was subsequently received in the Senate, read twice, and referred to the Committee on the Judiciary.

CAIR POSITION: IN SUPPORT OF THE MEASURE

PROVIDE A PATH FOR IMMIGRANTS TO GAIN PERMANENT RESIDENT STATUS

H.R. 6 - AMERICAN DREAM AND PROMISE ACT OF 2019

ABOUT: H.R. 6 requires DHS to stop the removal of minors and those who qualified for temporary protected status or deferred enforced departure status who have illegally entered the United States. They must give minors permanent resident status for 10 years.

STATUS: H.R. 6 was passed in the House by Yea/Nay vote of 237-187.

CAIR POSITION: IN SUPPORT OF THE MEASURE

PROTECTING THE RIGHT OF UNIONS TO ORGANIZE

H.R. 2474 / S. 1306 – PROTECTING THE RIGHT TO ORGANIZE ACT OF 2019

ABOUT: H.R. 2474 and S.1306 amend the National Labor Relations Act and related labor laws to extend protections to union workers who join and negotiate for better working conditions. This act protects employees who participate in strikes from replacement or discrimination by employers. It further authorizes meaningful penalties for employers that violate workers' rights.

STATUS: H.R. 2474 was approved by the U.S. House of Representatives by a vote of 224 to 194. S.1306 was referred to the Senate Committee on Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions.

CAIR POSITION: IN SUPPORT OF THE MEASURES

ESTABLISH AN OFFICE DEDICATED TO ADDRESSING CONDITIONS AFFECTING BLACK MEN AND BOYS

H.R. 1636 / S. 2163 - COMMISSION ON THE SOCIAL STATUS OF BLACK MEN AND BOYS ACT

ABOUT: S. 2163 and H.R. 1636 create the Commission on the Social Status of Black Men and Boys as a department within the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights. The Commission is authorized to conduct systematic research into socioeconomic conditions affecting black men and boys. It will then provide recommendations to solve identified issues.

The Commission will work on issues including education, civil rights, healthcare, labor and employment, and housing.

STATUS: S. 2163 was amended by S.A. 1809 (to require equal party membership on the Commission) and passed the Senate by Voice Vote. H.R. 1636 was approved by the U.S. House of Representatives by a vote of 368-1. President Trump signed it into law.

CAIR POSITION: IN SUPPORT OF THE MEASURES

AN ACT TO REPEAL PRESIDENT DONALD TRUMP'S MUSLIM AND AFRICAN BAN EXECUTIVE ORDERS

H.R. 2486 - FUTURE Act [NO BAN Act; Access to Counsel Act of 2020]

S.1123 - NO BAN ACT

About: H.R. 2486 - The FUTURE Act is a combination of the NO BAN Act and the Access to Counsel Act. The NO BAN Act portion of the bill passed 233-183 and would repeal each iteration of the Muslim and African Ban. Introduced in April 2019 by Senator Chris Coons (D-DE) and Representative Judy Chu (D-CA), the act includes three critical components to fighting the Muslim Ban:

- The NO BAN Act repeals each iteration of the Muslim and African Ban – including one that specifically targeted refugees for extreme vetting – as well as an asylum ban issued after the Supreme Court's ruling and that relied on the same authority as the Muslim Ban;
- It amends the Immigration Nationality Act's nondiscrimination provision to explicitly prohibit discrimination based on religion and to apply all nondiscrimination protections to immigrant and nonimmigrant visa applicants alike; and,
- It responsibly limits overly broad executive authority to issue future bans by, among other things, imposing stricter requirements and mandatory reporting to Congress.

The act was merged with Representative Pramila Jayapal's (D-WA) Access to Counsel Act of 2020 – an act that would guarantee CBP and ICE provide persons detained for more than an hour in secondary screening access to their private legal counsel, including non-citizens and unaccompanied children, who may be detained at the U.S. border or ports-of-entry for long periods of time.

STATUS: Having already passed in the Senate by a voice vote but heavily amended in the House, the bill will need to be resolved by both chambers in conference and agreed to in a final vote.

CAIR POSITION: IN SUPPORT OF THE MEASURES

HEALTH AND ECONOMIC RECOVERY AMID COVID-19 OUTBREAK

H.R. 6800 – THE HEROES ACT

ABOUT: H.R. 6800, introduced by Representative Nita Lowey (D-NY), responds to the national COVID-19 outbreak by allocating federal funds to state, local, tribal, and territorial governments. The bill additionally provides funding for and establishes requirements for COVID-19 testing and contact tracing. Among other federal allocations, H.R. 6800 provides direct payments of up to \$1,200 per individual.

STATUS: H.R. 6800 passed the House with 208 votes in the affirmative and 199 negative votes.

CAIR POSITION: IN SUPPORT OF THE MEASURE

INCREASE ACCOUNTABILITY FOR LAW ENFORCEMENT MISCONDUCT AND END DISCRIMINATORY PRACTICES

S. 3912 - JUSTICE IN POLICING ACT OF 2020

H.R. 7120 - George Floyd Justice in Policing Act of 2020

ABOUT: S. 3912 and H.R. 7120 makes it easier to prosecute law enforcement officers for misconduct by lowering the criminal intent standard, limiting qualified immunity as a defense, and authorizing the Department of Justice to issue subpoenas to investigate discriminatory practices. The bills also create a national registry for data on police misconduct, prohibit racial profiling, and establish new use-of-force and discrimination prevention methods.

STATUS: H.R. 7120 was passed in the House by Yea/Nay vote of 236-181. S. 3912 was read twice and referred to the Committee on the Judiciary.

CAIR POSITION: IN SUPPORT OF THE MEASURES

REMOVAL OF U.S. ARMED FORCES IN THE REPUBLIC OF YEMEN

H.J.Res.37 - DIRECTING THE REMOVAL OF U.S. ARMED FORCES FROM HOSTILITIES IN THE REPUBLIC OF YEMEN THAT HAVE NOT BEEN AUTHORIZED BY CONGRESS

ABOUT: H.J.Res.37 calls on the President to remove the U.S. Armed Forces in Yemen in the next 30 days unless Congress decides on a later date, issues a declaration of war, or authorizes the use of Armed Forces. The President must also submit a risk assessment report to Congress within 90 days after signing the act into law.

STATUS: H.J.Res.37 passed in the House in a vote of 248-177; it was subsequently received in the Senate, read twice, and referred to the Committee on Foreign Relations.

CAIR POSITION: IN SUPPORT OF THE MEASURE

NATIONAL EMERGENCY - U.S AND MEXICO BORDER

H.J.Res.46/S.J.Res.54 - RELATING TO A NATIONAL EMERGENCY DECLARED BY THE PRESIDENT ON FEBRUARY 15, 2019

ABOUT: H.J.Res.46 and S.J.Res.54 would end the national emergency related to the U.S.-Mexico border declared by the President on February 15, 2019.

STATUS: H.J.Res.46 failed a Yea-Nay vote of 248 - 181 in which a 2/3 majority was required to override the President's veto; the bill and the accompanying veto message were subsequently referred to the Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure. S.J.Res.54 failed a Yea-Nay vote of 53-36 in which a 2/3 majority was required to override the President's veto.

CAIR POSITION: IN SUPPORT OF THE MEASURES

REMOVING DEADLINE FOR RATIFYING THE ERA

H.J.Res.79 - REMOVING THE DEADLINE FOR THE RATIFICATION OF THE EQUAL RIGHTS AMENDMENT (ERA)

ABOUT: H.J.Res.79 is a joint resolution that prohibits discrimination based on the gender of an individual. This amendment was proposed in 1972 and passed in both chambers of Congress. It was given a seven-year ratification deadline. However, only 30 of the required 38 states ratified the ERA as momentum slowed in the coming years after its passage.

With women's activism on the rise from the #MeToo Movement and the annual Women's Marches, the ERA regained attention and is finally being addressed.

STATUS: H.J.Res.79 was received in the Senate, read twice, and referred to the Committee on the Judiciary.

CAIR POSITION: IN SUPPORT OF THE MEASURE

AN ACT THAT WOULD LIMIT FREE SPEECH AND THE RIGHT TO BOYCOTT HUMAN RIGHTS VIOLATIONS IN ISRAEL

H.R.336 / S.1 - STRENGTHENING AMERICA'S SECURITY IN THE MIDDLE EAST ACT OF 2019

ABOUT: H.R.336 and S.1 oppose Americans' right to boycott by permitting state and local governments to divest from entities attempting to sway Israeli policy through utilizing boycotts, divestment, or sanctions.

Additionally, in "the largest single pledge of military assistance ever," this legislation secures military aid to Israel in the amount 33 billion USD over a ten-year period through FY2028. These bills also include provisions to extend defense cooperation with Jordan through FY2022 and impose sanctions on individuals and military forces supporting Syria.

STATUS: H.R.336 was referred to the Subcommittee on Space and Aeronautics. S.1. passed the Senate in a vote of 77-23.

CAIR'S POSITION: IN OPPOSITION TO THE MEASURES

AN ACT TO PROHIBIT FUNDING FOR ISRAEL'S MILITARY DETENTION OF CHILDREN IN ANY COUNTRY, INCLUDING ISRAEL

H.R.2407 - PROMOTING HUMAN RIGHTS FOR PALESTINIAN CHILDREN LIVING UNDER ISRAELI MILITARY OCCUPATION ACT

ABOUT: In response to Israel's detainment, abuse, and torture of thousands of Palestinian children, some as young as 11, Rep. Betty McCollum (D-MN) introduced H.R.2407 which prohibits foreign-assistance funds from being used to enable military detention of children in any country. The legislation specifically authorizes 19 million USD to fund NGOs monitoring military detention of Palestinian children and rehabilitating victims under 21 who have been subject to related Israeli human rights abuses.

STATUS: H.R.2407 was referred to the House Committee on Foreign Affairs.

CAIR POSITION: IN SUPPORT OF THE MEASURE

ENHANCING THE RIGHTS OF DOMESTIC WORKERS

H.R. 3760 – DOMESTIC WORKERS BILL OF RIGHTS ACT

S. 2112 – DOMESTIC WORKERS BILL OF RIGHTS ACT

ABOUT: H.R. 3760 and S. 2112 provide protection for domestic workers, including guaranteeing them a minimum wage and overtime pay. These measures would extend civil rights protections from workplace harassment and discrimination to domestic workers.

STATUS: H.R. 3760 was last referred to the House Committee on Energy and Commerce Subcommittees on Health. S. 2112 was referred to the Senate Committee on Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions.

CAIR POSITION: IN SUPPORT OF THE MEASURES

PROTECTING AND ADMITTING REFUGEES, ASYLUM SEEKERS, AND OTHER VULNERABLE INDIVIDUALS

H.R. 5210 / S. 2936 – REFUGEE PROTECTION ACT OF 2019

ABOUT: H.R.5210 and S.2936, respectively introduced by Representative Zoe Lofgren (D-CA) and Senator Patrick Leahy (D-VT), strengthen protections for refugees and asylum seekers. The bill broadens asylum guidelines to include individuals fleeing gender-based violence and provides stronger protections for the treatment of asylum seekers at the Southern border.

Additionally, the legislation mandates that a minimum of 95,000 annual refugees be accepted and resettled in the U.S.

STATUS: H.R. 5210 was referred to the Committee on the Judiciary's Subcommittee on Immigration and Citizenship. S. 2936 was referred to the Senate Committee on the Judiciary.

CAIR POSITION: IN SUPPORT OF THE MEASURES

LEGISLATION PROHIBITING BOYCOTTS

H.R. 5595 – ISRAEL ANTI-BOYCOTT ACT

ABOUT: Introduced by Representative Lee Zeldin (R-NY), the Israel Anti-Boycott Act would amend the Export Administration Act of 2018 by prohibiting boycotts and requests for boycotts imposed by international governmental organizations against Israel. In other words, this bill would prevent international organizations such as the European Union or United Nations from being able to request information from American companies that could possibly restrict trade practices or foster boycotts “against other countries friendly to the United States.”

CAIR believes that the legislation’s purpose is to establish Congress’ opposition to the Boycott, Divestment, and Sanctions (BDS) movement and to intimidate Americans from supporting a campaign that defends the human rights of Palestinians. BDS is the same peaceful method of political activism has been used to challenge injustice in America and worldwide, including against one of the greatest forms of injustice in our time – apartheid. Americans have engaged in political boycotts since the nation’s founding. The Colonial American boycott of British tea imports and the Montgomery Bus Boycott during the civil rights era are examples of historic American boycotts.

STATUS: H.R. 5595 was referred to the House Committee on Foreign Affairs.

CAIR POSITION: IN OPPOSITION TO THE MEASURE

URGING INDIA TO PRESERVE RELIGIOUS FREEDOM OF ALL RESIDENTS

H.Res. 745 – URGING THE REPUBLIC OF INDIA TO END THE RESTRICTIONS ON COMMUNICATIONS AND MASS DETENTIONS IN JAMMU AND KASHMIR AS SWIFTLY AS POSSIBLE AND PRESERVE RELIGIOUS FREEDOM FOR ALL RESIDENTS

ABOUT: Introduced by Representative Pramila Jayapal (D-WA), H.Res.745 urges the government of India to respect the human rights of all people and adhere to international human rights laws. It demands that the government lift restrictions on communication and internet access and release arbitrarily detained people in Jammu and Kashmir.

STATUS: H.Res.745 was referred to the House Committee on Foreign Affairs.

CAIR POSITION: IN SUPPORT OF THE MEASURE

CALLING FOR AN END TO ARBITRARY DETENTION, TORTURE, AND HARASSMENT OF TURKIC MUSLIMS BY CHINA

S. 3744- UYGHUR HUMAN RIGHTS POLICY ACT OF 2020

ABOUT: S. 3744 imposes sanctions against actors responsible for the human rights abuses in the Xinjiang Uyghur Autonomous region of China. It requires the President to regularly identify and subsequently sanction individuals and entities engaging in human rights abuses. This act calls for measures to protect foreign nationals working or studying in the U.S. from harassment by the Chinese government. It demands a full investigation of the scope and scale of methods and technology being used for detention and forced labor of China's Muslim minority.

STATUS: S. 3744 was passed by the U.S. Senate without amendment by Unanimous Consent. The U.S. House of Representatives agreed to pass S. 3744 by a Yea/Nay vote of 413-1. The Act was signed into law by President Trump.

CAIR POSITION: IN SUPPORT OF THE MEASURE

PROTECTING CITIZENS' INTERNET HISTORY

S.Amdt. 1583 to H.R. 6172

ABOUT: S.Amdt 1583 to H.R.6172, proposed by Senator Ron Wyden (D-OR), would amend the USA Freedom Reauthorization Act of 2020 by limiting law enforcement agencies' ability to access citizens' web browsing and Internet search data without a warrant. This amendment would curb the FBI's ability to access certain business records for foreign intelligence and international terrorism investigations without a warrant.

STATUS: S.Amdt 1583 failed in a vote of 59-37, falling short of the required 60 votes in the affirmative.

CAIR POSITION: IN SUPPORT OF THE MEASURE

NOMINATION OF MENASHI

PN1054 - NOMINATION OF STEVEN MENASHI

ABOUT: President Trump nominated Steven Menashi for the United States Court of Appeals in the 2nd Circuit.

Steven Menashi has a history of defending ethno-nationalism and perpetuating the racist myth that U.S. Gen. John Pershing executed Muslim prisoners in the Philippines with bullets dipped in “pigs’ blood.”

STATUS: He was confirmed on November 14th, 2019 by the U.S Senate.

CAIR POSITION: IN OPPOSITION TO THE NOMINATION

ESTABLISHMENT OF THE COVID-19 RACIAL AND ETHNIC DISPARITIES TASK FORCE WITHIN THE DEPARTMENT OF HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES

S.3721 - COVID-19 Racial and Ethnic Disparities Task Force Act of 2020

ABOUT: The task force must provide reports and recommendations related to racial and ethnic disparities in the COVID-19 (i.e., coronavirus disease 2019) response to Congress and relevant federal agencies. First, the task force must report weekly on COVID-19 infections and patient outcomes with data disaggregated by race and ethnicity. The reports must also identify communities with high levels of racial and ethnic disparities in COVID-19 measures and recommend how to allocate health care and other resources to address these disparities. Second, the task force must report biweekly on the disbursement of federal COVID-19 relief funds and how to use any undisbursed funds to address racial and ethnic disparities. Lastly, the task force must submit a final report that describes factors that contributed to racial and ethnic disparities, with respect to the COVID-19 pandemic, with recommendations to address them in responses to future infectious disease outbreaks.

STATUS: Referred to the Senate Committee on Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions.

CAIR POSITION: IN SUPPORT OF THE MEASURE
